



WORKSHOP GARDEN MURAL DESIGN CONCEPT



This design celebrates the presence of the Ohlone Tiger Beetle and the Mount Hermon June Beetle. In the center, a blue vervain plant blossoms it's purple flowers, a color that attracts pollinators. The background is set by sprawling ferns over a starry night sky. The design can be made to fit a space as wide as 50 feet or shortened to 30 feet. Height is approximately 8 ft and can also be modified to fit the appropriate space.

WORKSHOP MURAL INSTALLATION CONCEPT

Garden installation

8 ft x 8 ft panels

Can be installed in cube format, as a long 32 ft x 8 ft mural, or as 4 separate panels dispersed through the garden

Spray paint and acrylic

Test panels for practice before final execution

Use of urban street art materials for community empowerment





Through applied learning and hands on instruction, our students develop the necessary toolset to install a mural from start to finish. In mural installation students have the opportunity to practice direct communication, creative problem solving, collaboration, and artistic understanding.

Our workshops prepare our students for murals by building confidence in skill set and communication. Team bonding takes the workshop to the next level in order to prepare them for professional installation. Our students will learn proper safety and mural etiquette while working on the wall.

Artist Bio

Alisan C. Andrews, SWA, SAG



Alisan Andrews has been painting since childhood and showed promise early while taking classes at the Santa Barbara Art Museum and with her artist grandmother. She produced two award-winning murals and sold most of her work while still in high school in Santa Barbara.

Alisan majored in Fine Arts and worked mostly in oils. A popular artist with Bay Area musicians, she exhibited her paintings and was featured in "Night on the Town" in the San Francisco Chronicle. Over thirty of her paintings have been sold in the Bay Area and the US.

Changing her focus to watercolor, Alisan studied at the University of Santa Cruz with Jane Hofstetter, Ferenc Besze, Stuart Givot, Karen Frey, Sonja Hamilton, Dale Laitner, and others. In June 2011, she was juried into the Triton Museum's Midsummer Art Festival. She has also taken numerous workshops and classes to develop her craft.

Alisan taught at the College of San Mateo Community Education from 2011 to 2015 and now offers private lessons in groups and to individuals. She also teaches an intergenerational (14——to 83-year-old) watercolor class at the Highlands Park Senior and Community Center in Ben Lomond, CA.

Alisan is a Signature Member of the Society of Western Artists and Sequoia Art Group. She also belongs to the Silicon Valley Watercolor Society, Pacific Art League, and California Watercolor Association. She is a member of the Santa Cruz Mountains Art Center member and recently won an award for her "Blue Moon" painting in the "Water: Ebb and Flow" exhibit.

Her work has been shown at the Society of Western Artists Art Center, Caldwell Gallery, and Triton Museum, as well as in numerous shows, homes, and businesses from California to the New York Islands. She has received awards from the Society of Western Artists, the Sequoia Art Group, the San Mateo County Fair, the Silicon Valley Watercolor Society, and others.

Kara Saiki

Our own piece of Broadway From sketches, to stage.

When I found out my school's theater department was putting on a production of the Lion King Jr. my director and I's first thought was, what are we going to do for the lion head masks? With support from my amazing director, Mrs. Neall, I was honored with full creative liberty to create these masks as I saw fit. For nearly 2 months straight I worked on designing and crafting 4 individual lion heads, that both looked appealing, and were functional for stage use. With only cardboard, hot blue, and paper mache I had to create these decorative masks that could withstand dancing and singing without moving around on the actors head. This was no easy task, for custom measurements had to be taken of each person's head, and since our lion king production was double cast each head needed to be adjustable to compensate for the actors' different sized heads. Eventually I was able to come up with a way to add adjustable velcro straps to each mask hidden under a flap which would later be covered by the mane of feathers. This is just one example of the multitude of issues I had to troubleshoot in the creation of these masks. Another considerable issue was to do with the exterior design, for while our *Lion King Jr.* took heavy inspiration from the official Lion King that runs on Broadway, I needed to decide what route my masks would take. In my research I commonly saw other theater companies trying to directly recreate the Lion King masks from Broadway. While I definitely took inspiration from the broadway masks I also knew I wanted my lions to be their own work, one with similarities to the broadway but that also had elements from the original 1994 movie, along with my own creative interpretation. With this I took the color schemes from the original movie, added them to the shapes and dynamics of the broadway, and added my own creative symbolism to the markings on their faces and the shape and texture of their mane. Specifically I used the marking on the characters face to represent their rankings and personalities. For example the circular red marking on their forehead represents the lion's place in the "circle" of life, and the stripes to resemble sun rays. Additionally If you look closely you'd notice scar, the lead villain lion is missing these marks, and instead has asymmetrical stripes to represent his disruptive and unbalanced nature. Its details like these that make me so proud of these works, for initially I had no idea whether I even had to skillset to execute a project of this complexity. After nearly 90 hours of work and many late nights I'm proud to call this project my own, and this not only pushed myself beyond where I thought my limits lie, but was an overall wonderful learning experience that gave me practice in sculpting, but also allowed me to practice in costume making. Overall this project was an amazing opportunity and I will look back on these masks fondly, and from this project I will continue to make many different kinds of art, in or out of my comfort zone. I'd like to reiterate my thanks to my director who made this project possible and I hope my art was able to bring a little bit of broadway right to our stage.

I have also created numerous posters and murals for local merchants, service organizations, schools and public agencies. In 2018 my design was selected for Monterey County's first Official Government Flag. I completed a murals at Watsonville High, Alianza, Watsonville Census at Ramsay Park. I also created a mural at Santa Cruz Naturals in Pajaro. I also had murals on display at the Watsonville City Center as part for the City - Pajaro Valley Arts Movable Murals Project. Additionally I also had art displayed at Pajaro Valley Art Gallery. Most recently I also created art for two utility boxes on Main Street in Watsonville and mural design work for Ramsey park nature center in Watsonville.

My work is inspired by my culture, my community music, & the beauty of the land around me. Pajaro Valley is an area of cultural richness of the Watsonville community. I often uses bright bold colors and illustrations in the style of Mexican traditions to integrate in my art pieces. My goal is to create pieces that are attractive, captivating and tell a story. I am primarily self-taught as a painter and a muralist. I also acquired skills in computer graphic design and body art tattoo design. I hope to inspire other artist of all ages that theres a lot you can do with your artistic skills if you put your heart in soul in it.

Rebeca Escobedo Artist Spotlight Nomination

The biggest part of my artistic journey is embracing experimentation. My body of work consists of exploring with whatever materials I can get my hands on. It began with acrylics a few years ago and slowly I began to integrate embroidery onto the canvases. It wasn't something I had seen a lot of, so I began to incorporate it more and more - it eventually became a part of my signature style. That then led me to purchase a sewing and embroidery machine two years ago. That purchase opened my art to a world of possibilities that I would have never imagined.

I first approached sewing from a "crafter" standpoint, making sure to learn all the ins and outs to familiarize myself with the technique. It took over a year, but once I felt comfortable I began to infuse sewing and fabric into my art as well. Since then, I would describe my current body of work as playful and full of color - using it to tell the story of my upbringing.

As a Mexican immigrant, deeply connected to my heritage, I'm currently trying to tie my culture into my visual art pieces. Especially when using a medium like sewing that's entrenched in tradition. Sewing and fabric, to me, is the only art form that links me to both my mother and grandmother, so it holds a special place in my heart. Looking ahead, I aspire to experiment with more intricate fabric designs and seek opportunities to showcase my work in exhibitions and through grants. My big goal this year is to apply for Open Studios, where I aim to reach a wider audience by displaying my fabric art pieces.

In the long term, my vision extends beyond my individual practice. I dream of establishing a nonprofit sanctuary for artists, a space that fosters creativity, elevates youth, and thrives on community engagement. I am currently working in the arts at two nonprofits as the Marketing Coordinator for the Santa Cruz Art League and the Administration and Program Coordinator at Senderos. Working in the arts has given my life's outlook a whole new meaning. I deeply value the transformative power that art holds and its ability to enrich lives and communities, especially when it's presented early on in life.

My recent artwork is a group of mixed media paintings which explore the natural environment; and combine acrylic, collage, drawing, and relief printmaking. I developed this style about 5 years ago, by combining different elements of previous bodies of work into a new one. The natural world inspires me, as it thrives while being unexpected and challenging... and it's gorgeous.

By focusing on the lush and diligent natural world I invite viewers to examine their own relationships with nature. Overlapping images, color, memories and different art materials, I strive to create a strata of ideas and invoke remembrances of real or imagined pasts. Memories underlay all we do and see, under the surface of soil (beneath intertwined plants, plastic, roots, bones) seeds wait to sprout. These seeds may take centuries to grow into big trees, or grow into flowers that bloom for a day.

Being a Spotlight Award Artist would foster an enriching environment for me to further explore these ideas, and would encourage growth in my art practice. I would be honored to be considered for this amazing opportunity. I look forward to continuing to pursue questions of time with nature, home, and memory with my work. I'm excited about exploring these ideas in conversation, focus, research and through the act of painting itself.

I can't tease art apart from anything else, it is intertwined with all aspects of my life and work. Lately I've been reflecting on my artistic journey, as I approach the future. Like a meadow, life always has so many overlaps - for all of us. I have recently been married, started work in arts administration, and started more regular care for my parents as they travel though dementia and cancer. I feel shifts in my artwork as well, and am excited to work with these changes to create new and exciting elements of paintings.

I am grateful to teach a variety of art processes to a variety of age groups, and to work with artists daily. I show my paintings as often as I can, and my momentum has been building over the last couple of years. I pursue art in all parts of my life, and love how all opportunities and possibilities feed one another, and art supports everything.
